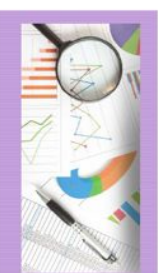

LSUHC School of Public Health FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH THE UPTAKE OF CONTRACEPTION AMONG THE LOUISIANA MEDICAID POPULATION AT RISK OF UNINTENDED PREGNANCY

Unintended pregnancies, occurring in nearly one out of every two (49%) pregnancies in the United States, are the leading cause of abortion. Louisiana had the second highest unintended pregnancy rate (49%) in 2010 in the United States and the second worst rates of infant mortality, low birthweight, and preterm birth in 2013. The purpose of this research was to explore the factors associated with unintended pregnancies among the Louisiana Medicaid population. A retrospective repeated cross-sectional study was designed to gain a better understanding of the patient, provider, and system factors associated with unintended contraceptive use and LARC uptake among populations at high risk of unintended pregnancy.

Using Louisiana Medicaid claims data from 2013-2015, we examined the association between patient and provider characteristics and LARC uptake among populations at high risk of unintended pregnancy.

7 WAYS TO IMPROVE HPV VACCINATION RATES

1. **PROVIDER**
The provider is the most important factor in HPV vaccination rates. The provider should be encouraged to offer HPV vaccination to all eligible patients.
2. **CONSENT AND ASSENT**
The provider should obtain consent from the patient and assent from the parent/guardian before administering the vaccine.
3. **SECURE AND APPROPRIATE RECORD KEEPING**
The provider should maintain accurate records of HPV vaccination status for all eligible patients.
4. **PROVIDER KNOWLEDGE**
The provider should be up-to-date on the latest HPV vaccination guidelines and recommendations.
5. **STANDARD PROTOCOLS**
The provider should have a standard protocol for HPV vaccination that is easy to follow.
6. **RECORDING AT THE END OF VISIT**
The provider should record HPV vaccination status at the end of the visit.
7. **INSURANCE COVERS IT**
The provider should ensure that HPV vaccination is covered by the patient's insurance.

Courtney Wheeler, MPH
Courtney Wheeler is a second-year Public Health Associate Program (PHAP) Associate (Class of 2018) for the Office for State, Tribal and Community Outreach (OSTCO) Office of the Director (PHAPCO). Ms. Wheeler has been assigned to the Louisiana Health and Cancer Health Program (LHCHP), Louisiana State University School of Public Health since October 2015. She is currently a Public Health Associate (PHA) at the Louisiana State University School of Public Health and Social Justice with a joint concentration in Behavioral Science, Health Education and Epidemiology.



IMPLICATIONS FOR PRACTICE: Findings suggest successful methods to encourage HPV vaccination are being implemented in Louisiana. The majority of these practices debuted in "7 Ways to Improve HPV Vaccination Rates," should be easily replicable in the average clinic, while HPV vaccination rates.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Positive Deviance approach looks for uncommon but successful practices that require little additional resources. As such, these practices should be highly replicable and sustainable. The final step in the process is dissemination of the identified successful deviant practices.

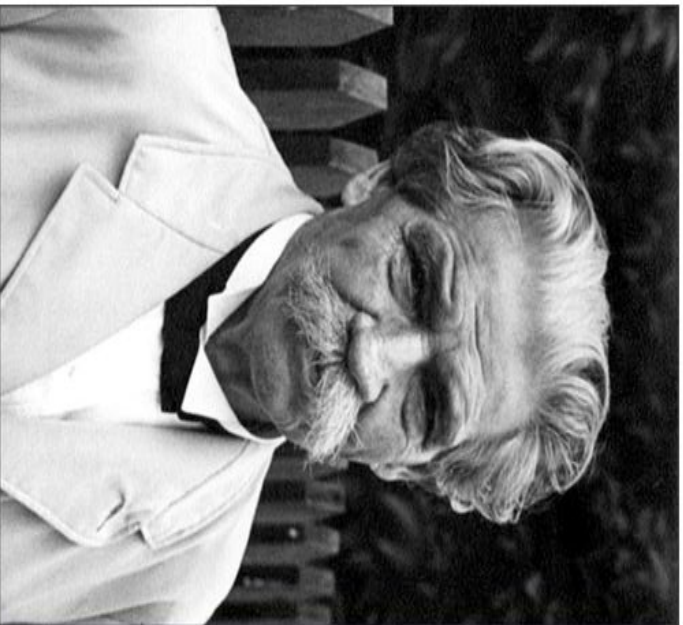

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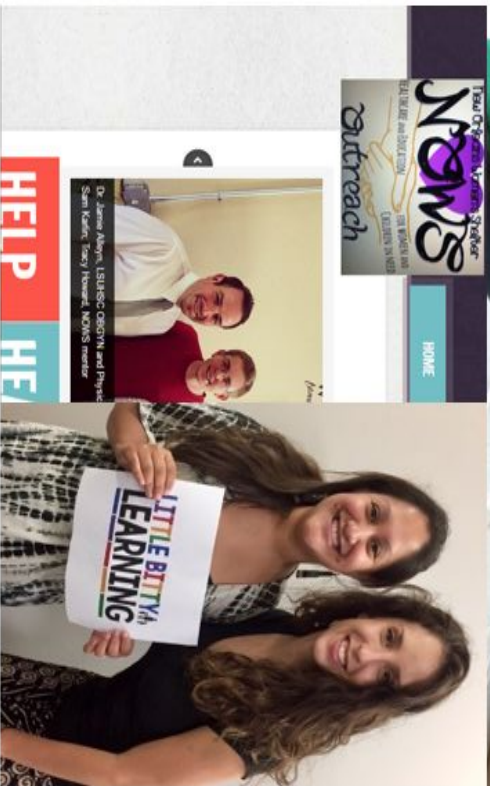
