Funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's "Lead and Healthy Homes Technical Studies" 3-year grant, Dr. Adrienne Katner (Assistant Professor, ENHS) is implementing an environmental health study using community-based participatory research approaches to characterize the effectiveness of commercially-available water filters in removing lead and iron from drinking water in communities with historical water infrastructure issues. This summer, Dr. Katner and research associate Aubrey Gilliland, MPH, began testing water and installing water filters in homes with elevated lead in New Orleans and Enterprise, LA. In fall, they plan to hold focus groups in rural communities and with Spanish-speaking populations to better understand the barriers to filter use and education needed to help residents select, install and maintain the most appropriate water filters.

In the summer of 2016, the <u>AmeriHealth Caritas Health Policy Fellowship Program</u> was launched at LSU Health New Orleans Schools of Public Health and Medicine. The program, created and directed by **Dr. Peggy Honoré** and funded by AmeriHealth Caritas Louisiana, is open to LSU HSC medical students who are available immediately following completion of their first year of medical school for an eight week summer fellowship in Washington DC. The program aims to provide participating medical students with opportunities for real world applied experiences in the various aspects of health policy. Prior placement sites include Congressional Committees, Senate and House Offices, Congressional Research Service, National Rural Health Association, National Hispanic Medical Association, National Academy of State Legislators, and others.

Dr. Honore has also mentored Ayesha Umrigar, a PhD candidate studying genetics. Dr. Honore learned of Ms. Umrigar's interest in working for policy reform of healthcare coverage of patients whose disease/disability is a result of genetics. Subsequently, Ms. Umrigar connected with one of Dr. Honore's colleagues at the CDC's Division of Public Health Genomics, who in turn offered Ms. Umrigar an internship. Now, Ms. Umrigar is awaiting news from the CDC regarding a post-doctoral fellowship with which Dr. Honore guided her.

EXPANDING ACCESS TO EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICES IN BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

The **mission** is to support the state and its agencies, organizations, communities, and providers in the selection and implementation of evidence-based interventions to promote youth and family well-being, improve behavioral health outcomes, and to address challenges related to sustaining quality practice.

The Center for Evidence to Practice will serve the state of Louisiana as a hub for innovation and cross-sectoral collaboration to improve behavioral health services through capacity building with service providers and university programs.

The need for a Behavioral Health Evidence-Based Practice Center was demonstrated in the 2017 Louisiana Behavioral Health Provider Survey of Youth Related Services. This statewide survey, funded by the Office of Behavioral Health and executed by **Dr. Stephen Phillippi, Ph.D.** found less than 60% of the mental health services delivered under Medicaid coverage were reporting utilizing an evidence-based practice, and even fewer providers reporting the adoption of key research supported components, like written training curricula, structured supervision, fidelity monitoring, and manualized treatment. Thus, the Center for Evidence to Practice was created in hopes of bridging gaps and bring more evidence-based behavioral health practices to communities across the state of Louisiana.

The Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center Summer Research Internship Program culti-

vates the interests of high school and undergraduate students who want to pursue careers in public health, and basic and clinical sciences. During the two months, they learn research topics and techniques, conduct research with their mentors and attend weekly professional development seminars. The internship program concludes with the annual Poster Day at which all students present their research results. Public Health faculty: Drs. Tekeda Ferguson, Dan Harrington, Peggy Honore, Mei-Chin Hsieh, Elizabeth Levitzky and Edward Trapido and Ms. Martha Cuccia served as judges. Two of the five interns assigned to the School of Public Health took home first place awards.

The 42 program interns were matched with mentors at one of the six schools at LSUHSC for the eight-week summer program. Mentors for the other SPH interns included <u>Drs. Donna Williams</u>, <u>Dean Smith</u>, <u>Tung-sung Tseng</u> and <u>Hui-Yi Lin</u>. In past years, many students and their mentors have gone on to have their research presented at local, regional and national professional conferences, and published in medical or scientific journals.

Ms. Martha Cuccia, instructor at the LSUHSC School of Public Health, serves as assistant director of the Summer Research Internship Program. The program receives funding from NIAAA, Entergy, School of Medicine and Louisiana Cancer Research Center.

Blake Thompson, a Global Justice and Social Studies teacher at Livingston Collegiate Academy in New Orleans East spent two days meeting with public health faculty and staff to learn more about disciplines within public health. Dr. Levitzky also provided an overview of the SPH to the 3 teachers assigned to Health Sciences Center schools at their campus orientation.
